

Labor Market Analysis for Program Recommendation Early Childhood Education Occupations Cabrillo College

Prepared by the San Francisco Bay Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research

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Recommendation

Based on all available data, there appears to be an "undersupply" of Early Childhood Education workers compared to the demand for this cluster of occupations in the Bay region and in the SC-Monterey sub-region (Monterey, San Benito, Santa Cruz counties). There is a projected annual gap of about 936 students in the Bay region and 18 students in the SC-Monterey Sub-Region.

Introduction

This report provides student outcomes data on employment and earnings for TOP 1305.00 - Child Development/Early Care and Education programs in the state and region. It is recommended that these data be reviewed to better understand how outcomes for students taking courses on this TOP code compare to potentially similar programs at colleges in the state and region, as well as to outcomes across all CTE programs at Cabrillo College and in the region.

This report profiles Early Childhood Education Occupations in the 12 county Bay region and in the SC-Monterey subregion for a proposed new Early Childhood Education for Teaching Transitional Kindergarten program at Cabrillo College.

• Education Administrators, Kindergarten through Secondary (11-9032): Plan, direct, or coordinate the academic, administrative, or auxiliary activities of public or private elementary or secondary level schools.

Entry-Level Educational Requirement: Master's degree

Training Requirement: None

Percentage of Community College Award Holders or Some Postsecondary Coursework: 12%

• Preschool Teachers, Except Special Education (25-2011): Instruct preschool-aged children in activities designed to promote social, physical, and intellectual growth needed for primary school in preschool, day care center, or other child development facility. Substitute teachers are included in "Teachers and Instructors, All Other" (25-3099). May be required to hold State certification. Excludes "Childcare Workers" (39-9011) and "Special Education Teachers" (25-2050).

Entry-Level Educational Requirement: Associate's degree

Percentage of Community College Award Holders or Some Postsecondary Coursework: 38%

Kindergarten Teachers, Except Special Education (25-2012): Teach elemental natural and social science, personal hygiene, music, art, and literature to kindergarten students. Promote physical, mental, and social development. May be required to hold State certification. Substitute teachers are included in "Teachers and Instructors, All Other" (25-3099). Excludes "Special Education Teachers" (25-2050).

Educational Supply

There are 23 community colleges in the Bay Region issuing 2,140 awards on average annually (last 3 years ending 2021-22) on TOP 1305.00 - Child Development/Early Care and Education. In the SC-Monterey Sub-Region, there are three (3) community colleges that issued 215 awards on average annually (last 3 years) on this TOP code.

There are a three (3) other CTE educational institutions in the Bay Region issuing 463 awards on average annually (last 3 years ending 2021-22) on CIP 13.1210 - Early Childhood Education and Teaching. There are no other CTE educational institution in the SC-Monterey Sub-Region issuing awards on average annually (last 3 years) on this CIP code.

Gap Analysis

Based on the data included in this report, there is a large labor market gap in the Bay region with 3,539 annual openings for the Early Childhood Education occupational cluster and 2,603 annual (3-year average) awards for an annual undersupply of 936 students. In the SC-Monterey Sub-Region, there is also a gap with 233 annual openings and 215 annual (3-year average) awards for an annual undersupply of 18 students.
