

# **Program Endorsement Brief:**

Elementary School Teachers in the Greater Sacramento region

North/Far North Center of Excellence, September 2019

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#### INTRODUCTION

This report provides an overview of the labor market demand and educational program supply for elementary school teachers, except special education, in the Greater Sacramento region and the broader 22-county North Far North region.

# SUMMARY OF KEY FINDINGS

- The Greater Sacramento region is expected to see a 7.8% increase in elementary school teacher jobs over the next five years.
- Elementary school teachers are projected to have nearly 1,000 job openings in the Greater Sacramento region per year over the next five years.
- Median hourly wages for elementary school teachers are almost \$34 per hour.
- The typical entry-level education for an elementary school teacher is a bachelor's degree. In the state of California, elementary school teachers are also required to complete an authorized teacher certification program and hold a valid teaching credential.
- No regional community colleges offer a direct pathway for elementary teacher education and training, and regional community colleges no longer offer adjacent training for educational aides.

#### OCCUPATIONAL DEMAND

The following Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes related to the proposed program were included in the analysis:



Exhibit 2 compares the rates of change of the total number of jobs between 2008 and 2018 in the Greater Sacramento region, the North Far North region, and California. It also compares occupational demand projections from 2018 through 2023 across the same areas. The rate of change is indexed to the base year 2008 total number of jobs.

Exhibit 2. Rate of Change for Selected Occupations<sup>2</sup>





# WAGES AND JOB POSTINGS

Exhibit 3 compares the median hourly wages of the selected occupations in the study regions to the Sacramento Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) living wage for a one-adult household and a one-adult, one-child household.<sup>3</sup>

Exhibit 3. Wages for selected occupations<sup>4</sup>



Burning Glass identified a pool of 1,092 job postings in the Greater Sacramento region for the selected occupations. This data represents job listings posted online within the last year, from October 1, 2018, through September 30, 2019.

Exhibit 4 compares the 12-month job posting trends of the selected occupations to the median number of job postings in the Greater Sacramento region.

Exhibit 5. Top job postings locations for selected occupations<sup>6</sup>



# **EDUCATION AND TRAINING**

# PROGRAM SUPPLY

Analysis of existing educational programs shows that there is are two Taxonomy of Program (TOP) codes related to training for elementary school teacher occupations: 0802.00 – Educational Aide, and 0802.10 – Educational Aide, Bilingual. The corresponding Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) code for these programs is 13.1501 – Teacher Assistant/Aide.

In addition to those programs, there are two other CIP code programs in the Greater Sacramento region focused on training elementary school teachers: 13.1202 – Elementary Education and Teaching and 13.1210 – Early Childhood Education. These programs confer bachelor degrees.

Exhibit 11 compares the average total number of awards (certificates and degrees) conferred by colleges in the selected TOP and CIP codes in the Greater Sacramento region over the last three academic years.

Exhibit 11. Total awards conferred by Greater Sacramento post-secondary institutions, 2016-1912



#### **FINDINGS**

- While elementary school teacher jobs declined by 4% in the decade following the recession, job counts are projected to exceed pre-recession levels by 2023. The Greater Sacramento region is expected to see a 7.8% increase in elementary school teacher jobs over the next five years, 2018 2023.
- Elementary school teachers are projected to have nearly 1,000 job openings in the Greater Sacramento region per year over the next five years, 2018-2023. The North/Far North region is projected to have almost 1,500 job openings per year.
- Hourly wages for elementary school teachers are significantly above the living wage threshold for a single
  adult in the Greater Sacramento region. Median hourly wages for elementary school teachers are almost
  \$34 per hour vs. \$12.38 per hour for the living wage.
- Burning glass identified 1,092 job postings for elementary school teachers in the Greater Sacramento region. Most job postings were located in suburban neighborhoods in Sacramento and Placer counties.
- The typical entry-level education for an elementary school teacher is a bachelor's degree. In the state of California, elementary school teachers are also required to complete an authorized teacher certification program and hold a valid teaching credential.
- There are no community colleges in the Greater Sacramento region that offer training related to elementary teacher education and training. Regional community colleges no longer offer adjacent training for educational aides (Sacramento City's program is currently inactive, according to COCI 2.0).
- Two regional universities offer elementary school teacher preparation programs: CSU Sacramento and William Jessup University. These two universities awarded an average of 283 bachelor degrees between 2016-17 and 2017-18. Please note that 2018-19 awards data for CSU Sacramento and William Jessup University has not yet been released.

# **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Based on a three-year average of annual award in elementary school teacher preparation programs in the Greater Sacramento region (283 degrees), and projected yearly openings for related occupations (973 openings), the region appears to have some demand for programs related to the occupation.
- COE recommends moving forward with the development of an elementary school teacher preparation pipeline.

Occupations in this report were identified using O\*Net. Findings in this report were determined using labor market data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), U.S. Census Bureau data from Emsi, and jobs posting data from Burning Glass.
