1. Intro and Welcome	All introduce around the room.			
Current Status of Program:	Currently offer 10 courses:  Beginning: 7 sections of M10, an intro to the medium, history and basic skills in camera use, lighting, printing, digital and film, portraiture, and documentary.  Intermediate: both digital and film, and intro to fine art; requires students to create a visual journal.  Advanced 1&2: extension of intermediate with more emphasis on concept, working on an in-depth assignment over a longer term with continual feedback, and developing a small portfolio.  History of Photography: Survey of the history of the medium from early origins to the contemporary.  Studio Lighting 1&2: Introduction to using artificial light in the studio and on location.  Image Editing: Introduction to image editing techniques using Photoshop.  Intro to Photojournalism: Reporting, editorial and stock photography, professional practices.  Lab Practices: Individual projects and group critique.

Curriculum: Professional Practices in Photography  Create new course as part of a commercial proficiency award. Could be taught online or on ground.	Continued support from the committee to implement this important course.	Have begun work and will be ready to submit to curriculum committee in the Fall 2018.
3. Curriculum: Pre-Requisite to Intro to Photojournalism	Continued support for removing pre-requisite from Intro to Photojournalism.	Will be submitting change to the curriculum committee in the Fall of 2018 to remove the pre-req.
4. Proficiency Degrees: Create new proficiency award in Commercial Photography.	Continued support for a proficiency award in commercial photography. Consensus was that the award should include Image Editing, Intro to Photojournalism, Studio Lighting I, and the new Professional Practices in Photography course. Total of 11 units.	Will be submitting proposed award to the curriculum committee in the Fall of 2018.
5. Discussion about value of teaching large format photography in a digital age.	Bill Short expressed the idea that teaching the 4x5 camera can give students a better understanding of the underlying technology that digital cameras use to make photography easier. Stephen agreed and added that although not used in a commercial setting very much anymore, the satisfaction that students gained by mastering the camera gave them a confidence that expressed itself in other ways. Karin mentioned that students can also get frustrated with the different sets of equipment and that having consistent equipment would be a goal if we want to continue teaching large format photography.	Will continue to find ways of teaching this valuable skill. May need to purchase more 4x5 cameras and better lenses.
