- In 2017, there were 106,517 jobs in San Diego County for the industry group, Federal, State and Local Government.
- Between 2017 and 2022, this industry group is expected to add 4,523 jobs (4.2 percent) in the county.
 Comparatively, the projected growth rate for the nation is 1.8 percent.
- San Diego County exceeded the nation in average earnings per job in 2017, with \$113,730 average earnings per job compared to \$89,102 in the nation.
- There were 637 establishments for this industry group in 2017. An establishment is a physical location of economic activity for a business. A single company may have multiple establishments.
- For everyone one job added to the region in Federal, State and Local Government, 2.34 additional jobs are generated. A jobs multiplier includes the initial job addition and its resulting yield. For example, this industry group's jobs multiplier is 3.34, which is comprised of the initial job added (1.0) and the additional yield (2.34).

San Diego County, 2017³





Exhibit 3: Ethnic Breakdown for Federal, State and Local Government

Top 10 Occupations


The top 10 occupations employed by these industries are:

- Business Operations Specialists, All Other (SOC⁵ 13-1199): Includes business operations specialists such as Energy Auditors, Customers Brokers, Sustainability Specialists, Online Merchants, etc.
- Police and Sheriff's Patrol Officers (SOC 33-3051): Maintain order and protect life and property by
 enforcing local, tribal, State, or Federal laws and ordinances. Perform a combination of the following
 duties: patrol a specific area; direct traffic; issue traffic summonses; investigate accidents; apprehend and
 arrest suspects, or serve legal processes of courts.
- **Detectives and Criminal Investigators** (SOC 33-3021): Conduct investigations related to suspected violations of Federal, State, or local laws to prevent or solve crimes.
- Firefighters (SOC 33-2011): Control and extinguish fires or respond to emergency situations where life, property, or the environment is at risk. Duties may include fire prevention, emergency medical service, hazardous material response, search and rescue, and disaster assistance.
- Correctional Officers and Jailers (33-3012): Guard inmates in penal or rehabilitative institutions in
 accordance with established regulations and procedures. May guard prisoners in transit between jail,
 courtroom, prison, or other point. Includes deputy sheriffs and police who spend the majority of their time
 guarding prisoners in correctional institutions.
- Office Clerks, General (43-9061): Perform duties too varied and diverse to be classified in any specific
 office clerical occupation, requiring knowledge of office systems and procedures. Clerical duties may be
 assigned in accordance with the office procedures of individual establishments and may include a
 combination of answering telephones, bookkeeping, typing or word processing, stenography, office
 machine operation, and filing.
- Compliance Officers (13-1041): Examine, evaluate, and investigate eligibility for or conformity with laws
 and regulations governing contract compliance of licenses and permits, and perform other compliance and
 enforcement inspection and analysis activities not classified elsewhere.
- Eligibility Interviewers, Government Programs (43-4061): Determine eligibility of persons applying to receive assistance from government programs and agency resources, such as welfare, unemployment benefits, social security, and public housing.
- Lawyers (23-1011): Represent clients in criminal and civil litigation and other legal proceedings, draw up legal documents, or manage or advise clients on legal transactions. May specialize in a single area or may practice broadly in many areas of law
- Computer Occupations, All Other (15-1199): Other computer occupations such as GIS Technicians, Video
 Game Designers, Database Architects, Web Administrators, Business Intelligence Analysts, etc.

Of the top 10 occupations employed in in this industry group, Office Clerks, General has the most labor market demand with 3,868 annual openings in San Diego County (Exhibit 4). Annual openings are an estimated employment change and turnover for an occupation for a given year.⁶





Business Operations Specialists, All Other has the most number of jobs in Federal, State and Local Government, with 4,853 jobs in this industry group. The number of jobs for Business Operations Specialists, All Other is expected to increase by three percent in this industry group between 2017 and 2022 (Exhibit 5).7
