

Program Endorsement Brief: 1307.00/Hospitality

Los Angeles/Orange County Center of Excellence, November 2018

Summary:

The Los Angeles/Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to hospitality. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with relevant occupations.

The following summarizes key findings from this data brief:

- The number of jobs for the four middle-skill hospitality occupations studied in this report is projected to increase by 8% through 2022. More than 9,150 job openings will be available annually due to new job growth and replacement need (retirements).
- In the past 12 months, there have been 16,777 online job postings for the four middle-skill hospitality occupations in Los Angeles/Orange County.
- Two other related program recommendation requests were received between January and October 2018 from regional community colleges.
- Six colleges in the region have hospitality programs.
- Between 2014 and 2017, community colleges in the region conferred an average of 82 awards (associate degrees and certificates) in related training programs.

Occupational Demand—In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs for the four hospitality occupations selected is projected to increase by 8% through 2022. There will be more than 9,150 job openings per year due to new job growth and replacement need (retirements).

¹ Five-year change represents new job additions to the workforce. Annual openings include new jobs and replacement jobs that result from retirements and separations.

Wages—Entry-level wages for the four hospitality occupations studied in this report are between \$9.74 and \$13.14. Entry-level wages are lower than the MIT Living hourly wage for one adult in the region (\$13.54 in Los Angeles County and \$15.31 in Orange County). Experienced workers earn between \$27.05 and \$41.47 per hour, which is higher than the living wage.

Job Postings—There were 16,777 online job postings for the occupations of interest listed in the past 12 months. The majority of job postings are for assistant managers, restaurant managers, general managers, and shift leaders. Top specialized skills include: restaurant management, scheduling, customer service, cost control, and food safety. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region include: Marriott, Hilton, and chain restaurants such as Starbucks, El Pollo Loco, Jack in the Box, and Pizza Hut.

Educational Attainment—The BLS lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entrylevel education for three of the hospitality occupations (food service managers, lodging managers and first-line supervisors of food preparation and servicing workers), and a Bachelor's degree for meeting, convention, and event planners. The national-level educational attainment data indicates between 27% and 38% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. In Los Angeles/Orange County, 89% of job postings request a high school diploma or vocational training.

Community College Supply—Appendix A shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in Hospitality (1307.00). The colleges with the most completions in the region are: Mt. San Antonio and Glendale. Between January and October 2018, there were two other related program recommendation requests from regional community colleges.
